# <u>Recent meetings</u>....is this what you missed......?

July 20th: In a remarkably eloquent and confident presentation from one so young, Ella Kahan-Taylor gave an interesting talk on how she came to be the author of a published novel. Ella explained how, as a younger child she had been extremely nervous and totally lacking in self-confidence, and the trauma of the covid lockdown had made matters worse. to such an extent that she lost all her hair through alopecia. Encouraged by her mother, she decided to put her feelings into writing: slowly a novel emerged charting the progress of a third party character who was shadowing the emotional crisis that Ella herself was experiencing. Contact ultimatelv with a sympathetic publisher specialising in the writings of young people and mentored by them, her novel emerged and is selling, if not well, is nonetheless selling.

She describes it as a journey into self-acceptance and when asked by members as to club what her message is, she wisely said "Mv message is aimed at young people and it is this: 'change is normal', people need to learn young to accept change in their lives". She has certainly learned to face up to her and has changed fears verv dramatically!

The title is **"Stars cannot shine without darkness"** and retails at £8.99.

July 27th saw a return visit by John Farrow of the Wilts and Berks Canal Trust who gave an interestina presentation on the work going on locally as well as plans for the future. He took us through the history of the canals that were the lifeblood of the local economy in the late 18th and century. Constructed early 19th between 1795 and 1810 the Wilts and Berks (with its later spur than ran north from Swindon to Cricklade) was an important link between two existing canals and ran between Semington and Abingdon. However, the development and subsequent growth of the rail network put an end to the commercial value of the canals and they were abandoned in 1914.

The enterprising Canal Trust, was formed in 1997 with the aim of restoring a navigable route for leisure and community use.

Currently there are only relatively stretches of open short water notably the run through Wichelstowe where their narrow boat "Firefly" regularly takes trippers - but it is hoped to link these stretches, and a route has been identified which would circumvent the urban sprawl of Swindon and ultimately restore the full length of a canal that could lead to a leisure 'bonanza' with all manner of commercial leisure facilities in what is hoped will be a recreational resource. John was able to display some of the tremendous variety of flora and fauna that can be spotted along the towpath today.

He ended with a plea for volunteers not just in labouring along disused stretches of the old canal route, but in serving in their visitor/information centre, or for lawyers and engineers who might be able to act in an advisory capacity.

### August 3rd

In a fairly dynamic address, the District Governor, Ann Bartholomew, urged us all to keep up the good work that she knew we were doing. She took as the theme of her talk the slogans chosen by RI President. Gordon McInally and her own choice for her year as DG: " Create Hope in the World" and "Stronger Together". Her message which came across clearly can be summed up in a few of the 'soundbites' :

- team work is essential
- value the skills and expertise of older rotarians
- little things can make a big difference
- increasing membership is important but retaining members is critical
- Look after each other
- make yourself known in your community Ann recognised that as far as she could tell our club was doing well in all these areas and congratulated us on our success. She ended with something of a plea that as many as were able should join in the District Weekend Conference that will take place next June in Exeter.

## August 10th

Jane Milner-Barry was a guest speaker and gave a very interesting and at times provocative presentation on the subject of sustainability. She admitted that it is a subject that can be rather too technical and at best is " not much fun" but given the issues that are becoming increasingly selfevident across the world, it was clear that her worries are worries that we all share....the media has been filled with the horror stories from the Mediterranean, China, USA, Canada and Hawaii, where excessive weather conditions have made their impact felt. On a personal front for more than 30 vears she has been an ardent supporter of collecting and recycling as much waste as possible, and now as a Parish Counsellor is trying hard to promote sustainability as a topic across the town. When it comes out, Jane urged us to join in the consultation on the Local Plan which sustainability - and in will include particular the separate collection of ( in food waste the future it is destined for anaerobic digestion and the production of useful gases, rather than incineration and even more CO2.) She also pointed out that the local authority is taking steps to improve housing - absence of gas for heating, and the use of ground source heat pumps and improved insulation and to increase provision of chargers for She electric cars. particularly vaunted the introduction of the "solar together" scheme to use of solar encourage greater panels and batteries.

It was good to note that Jane had done her homework and was aware that worldwide Rotary is doing its bit towards improving sustainable resources in many different areas but as she gently pointed out to us, perhaps we might be more active in lobbying both locally and nationally!

Interesting questions and comments from club members indicated that it was a topic which had struck a chord with all of us.

### August 17th

This was a our monthly business meeting during which we heard that our finances are in a sound condition, committees working well and our planning lots of activities for the coming months. It was a joy to receive a report on the recent picnic for the Swindon Downs afternoon Group (see below) and the meeting endorsed the proposal of the club council to formally become " a white ribbon supporter" in the fight against Domestic Abuse - more of that anon.
