# <u>Recent meetings</u>....is this what you missed......?

## August 24th

Introduced last year by Rob Gillespie, from time to time one of the club is asked to be a castaway (as per "Desert Island Discs" and select 4 pieces of music. The "Club Castaway" at today's meeting was the club secretary, Steve, who ran through some of the 'highlights of his career' as an amateur musician, explaining his eclectic choice of music as he went along

Aged 8 and singing treble in a performance of Bach's "St Matthew Passion" gave him a very premature love of Bach - hence the extract of <u>Bach's</u> <u>Double Violin Concerto in D minor</u>

Having sung bass in his church choir for more than 60 years (as well as other choral societies and ensembles) he has a deep love of all sorts of church music and treated us to a rendition of <u>Stainer's</u> <u>"Nunc Dmittis"</u> performed by his own church choir.

In a surprise to many he admitted to having played the cello for many years and selected a movement of <u>the Elgar</u> <u>Cello Concerto</u> (Jacqueline Du Pré of course) and recounted an amusing tale that involved him holding up the start of a concert at the Sydney Opera House earlier this year as he made something of an entrance!

Having been a founding member of the group and after 25 years of singing with them, his final piece was a track from a "Ten in a Bar " disc, <u>"Sunny"</u> that included some glorious jazz piano.

As Bill pointed out in his vote of thanks, it is sometimes surprising what these castaway sessions reveal about our fellow rotarians!

### August 31st

An evening meeting at the Fox and Hounds in Wroughton when unfortunately the speaker planned for the meeting was unable to join us because of family problems but President Jeremy stepped into the breach and gave a thoughtprovoking talk on the subject of Heroism. This is a difficult topic to research as 'heroes' tend to be self-effacing and reticent about discussing their deeds, and as a result are the real heroes ever known? In conversations with various individuals it had become clear to Jeremy that true valour is often recognised only posthumously, when others talk about the courage and bravery of the deceased. He cited various examples he had discovered and in particular felt that high on his list were those S.O.E. agents of WW11 who without necessarily performing any single act of valour, had knowingly and willingly put themselves into a situation of peril, the ongoing threat of discovery torture and death being constantly with them.

Jeremy covered the impact of emotional damage on heroes who did not seek recognition or even thought that they deserved that epithet.

In summing up, he felt that several words might be used to identify 'a hero': courage, selflessness, and self-sacrifice, coupled with a degree of persistence, and he left us with an interesting thought that " we are all far more capable than we think we are!"



### September 7th

This was a straightforward 'Camaraderie meeting but with President Jeremy on holiday Past President Debbie took the chair and 18 of us sat down to dinner including visitor Dennis Puffett, (guest of Cliff) who is becoming a regular visitor.

### September 14th
